If a course you would like to take is **not listed in your program's bulletin** as fulfilling a specific program requirement, **please connect with your DGS** before registering for the course, to ensure that it will be allowed to count towards your program requirements.

Common Registration Holds & How to Clear Them

Sometimes, a student may have a hold placed on their account, which prevents course registration. If you have a hold that prevents registration, you will need to complete the action listed in the hold message before the hold can be removed. A hold may only be removed by the office that placed the hold.

Resource Highlight: Gelman Library Study Spaces & Technology

As we head into midterms season, here are some Gelman Library resources to help you study in peace, get ahead on a project, and set yourself up for a successful semester!

Graduate Study Spaces

The <u>Graduate Student Study Room</u> is a quiet study space on the fifth floor of Gelman Library, accessible via a tap of your GWorld card. The <u>Global Resources Center</u> on Gelman's seventh floor is open exclusively to graduate students outside of its staffed hours, also via your GWorld card.

In addition, students may <u>reserve</u> group study rooms and closed study carrels. If you really need to focus, consider reserving a closed study carrel on the 4th or 5th floors - **closed study carrels are available for reservation by graduate students only**, so you will not have to compete with undergraduate students to claim your spot.

Tech and Equipment

Books aren't the only thing you can check out from the library! As a GW student, you can borrow audiovisual equipment, including cameras, mics, tripods and lights, and

more by submitting an <u>equipment request</u>. Students may keep borrowed equipment for up to one week at a time, and there is no fee.

Within Gelman Library's <u>CREATE Digital Studio</u>, you can also use high-powered, multimedia editing computer workstations (both Mac and Windows), which are equipped with the full Adobe Creative Cloud suite of applications. If your editing or coding project is pushing your personal computer to its limits, consider stopping by the CREATE Digital Studio on the first floor of Gelman.

Giving a poster presentation? Need to print a custom part? You can also request <u>large-format and 3D printing</u> through Gelman.

Mellon/ACLS Dissertation Innovation Fellowship

Deadline: October 29, 2025 at 9:00pm ET

Mellon/ACLS Dissertation Innovation Fellowships support graduate students who show promise of leading their fields in important new directions. The fellowships are designed to intervene at the formative stage of dissertation development, before research and writing are advanced. The program seeks to expand the range of research methodologies, formats, and areas of inquiry traditionally considered suitable for the dissertation, with a particular focus on supporting scholars who can build a more diverse, inclusive, and equitable academy.

Eligible applicants must be Ph.D. students who have completed at least two years of their Ph.D. program and all required coursework, but who have not yet advanced to candidacy. Selected awardees will receive a year of support, including a base stipend and additional funding for project-related research, training, development, and travel costs, as they prepare to embark on innovative dissertation research projects in the humanities and interpretive social sciences. Charlotte W. Newcombe Doctoral Dissertation Fellowship

Deadline: November 1, 2025

Now in its fifth decade, the Newcombe Fellowship has become a nationally recognized award that distinguishes recipients within their fields. Fellows receive a \$31,000 stipend to complete the writing stage of their dissertation. Those awarded a Newcombe Fellowship are often at the forefront of creative and original scholarship, proposing new insights and ground-breaking work in the questions and conversations surrounding religion, ethics, and values.

Candidates are evaluated based on scholarly excellence; quality and originality of the project; and commitment to research that advances religious understanding, ethics, and values.
